Course: Introduction to gender studies

The world is gendered. People, behaviour and nations are categorised as masculine or feminine. The masculine is the norm of theory and politics; women are seen in most cases as a special case. This course will offer an introduction to gender studies from a postcolonial studies perspective. We will discuss feminism, the social construction of gender, gender as a perspective of analysis and look at queer and intersectional criticism.

The course will offer brief introductions to critical theories in order to illustrate the basic approaches. We will read in particular theoretical texts from India. The meetings will be organised interactively. The students will be asked to apply the theories on the basis of the course literature both to their life in the Czech Republic and to development studies.
